# message from the governor



Let's get our priorities straight. The primary purpose of Kiwanis is to provide service ... and that service is principally to children. We can and do that in lots of ways. And I'm going to be focusing on those service-related activities in future articles.

But ... we cannot provide service if we do not have the man/woman power to do the work. And that requires that we have a strong member base that is willing and able to provide meaningful service.

Don't get me wrong. We do a tremendous amount of service in Kentucky and Tennessee. KT Kiwanians invest more than \$1 million in service in our service area each year. That requires a great deal of fund raising and hands on service by

our more than 5,500 members.

But the fact is that our membership numbers are diminishing by the hundreds each year for the past five years. Loss of membership stretches everyone too thin - sometimes leading to the demise of Kiwanis clubs.

What is the answer? Clearly the infusion of new and vital members, is the answer. Not only will new members take some of the pressure off of older members, but it will give the new members an opportunity to serve their community. And the sooner they are involved in that service, the more likely it is that they will remain Kiwanians. Service is both the reason for our being ... and it is the reason we retain members.

Kiwanis International has designed a new program to encourage you to both make your club more dynamic and vital - but to also provide more service to your community. You can be that catalyst.

What is that Kiwanis International incentive program? It is called 1-2-3. It is an easy concept to remember.

Recruit one new member and you will earn a bronze key lapel pin, two new members and you will earn a silver key lapel pin and three new members and you will earn a gold key lapel pin.

Your club can order packets of bronze and silver and gold keys, at no cost, directly from Kiwanis International by calling 1-800-KIWANIS, ext. 411, or via e-mail at [memberservices@kiwanis.org](mailto:memberservices@kiwanis.org).

You need not submit key recipients information to Kiwanis International. The whole point is to generate membership - not to have an elaborate reporting system of individuals who bring in new members.

And if you would like for me to call any of your gold key recipients to compliment them on their recruiting efforts, I'd greatly appreciate your sending to me their name and their phone number.

There will be special gold key recipient recognition at the 2010 International Convention in Las Vegas.

Best wishes in your recruiting efforts - remember that our KT slogan this year is "Service through growth."

## KT Board of Trustees Adopt Two Significant Changes for District

The 2009-2010 Board of Trustees of the Kentucky Tennessee (K-T) District of Kiwanis International, in two separate, email and/or telephone votes adopted two significant measures.

In one action, the board approved the merger of Division 11 with Division 10, effective October 1, 2009. At the same time the board approved the renaming of Division 19 to become Division 11. The net result is that the K-T District will have 18 divisions rather than 19 divisions. The reduction of one Lt. Governor position will result in an annual savings of funds for the district.

Prior to the vote by the board, Governor-elect Glen Kleine met with the Kiwanis Club of Covington-Kenton County in Ft. Mitchell, KY and the Kiwanis Club of Williamstown, KY, the two clubs in Division 11. They discussed with the governor-elect the advantages to the district and that they would continue to receive the same services from the district.

Each club was asked to identify the division with which they wished to merge. Prior to the meetings these clubs the governor-elect sought and obtained the support from the Lt. Governors with whom these clubs were likely to merge. Both clubs expressed their preference of merging with Division 10. All of the board members that voted cast votes in favor of the merger.

Division 11 Lt. Governor Douglas C. "Doug" Beckham and the 2009-10 Lt. Governor Ken Reed agreed to this reorganization of divisions.

The motion went to the Board of Trustees on September 22, 2009. As of September 27, 2009 a majority of 15 voted in favor of reorganizing the divisions. As of September 27 the remaining 8 Lt. Governors had not voted on the matter.

Those voting in favor of the measure were: the 2008-2009 Governor, the 2009-2010 Governor, the 2009-2010 Governor-Elect, the District Secretary-Treasurer, and the 2009-2010 Lt. Governors from Divisions, 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17.

In another action, the board, by a unanimous vote of 23 to 0 voted to substitute six regional mid-year one-day conferences in lieu of the traditional multi-day mid-year conference.

The rationale for supporting this measure was the relative convenience of location, the lower cost to participate in a mid-year conference (no overnight stays, less distance to drive, fewer meals), and the likelihood that more Kiwanians would participate.

The regions are essentially based on the regional configuration outlined in the proposed reorganization plan that was discussed and tabled at the last district convention. With 18 divisions now in the district - each region will have three divisions.

The Lt. Governor with an asterix (below) is primarily responsible, in consultation with the other Lt. Governors in the region, with organizing the mid-year conference to be located within the region. The site for the regional mid-year conference will be located within the region.

It is recommended that the regional meetings be scheduled between January and mid March 2010, on non-competing Saturdays, so district officials will be able to attend all of the regional meetings. In order to achieve this the regional organizer will consult with the Governor in selecting the date for the regional conference.

In two cases, the Regions have already set the dates for their regional meetings. These are:

January 16, 2010 - Region 6 (tentatively to be held in Chattanooga, TN)

March 13, 2010 - Region 3 (no site selected).

In addition to providing workshops during the regional meetings, all divisions will be provided an opportunity to meet as divisions during this conference.

In the event that a division had not selected its Lt. Governors for 2010-11 and 2011-12 at their governor's dinner, the division will be expected to complete this task at their division meetings scheduled for the regional conference. All 2010-11 Lt. Governors will need to be in place and committed to attend the Lt. Governor's Training tentatively set for March 26-28, 2010.

Clubs will also be encouraged to develop poster presentations about the activities of their club and put them on display at the regional meetings. The top three club poster presentations will be displayed at the District Convention scheduled for Clarksville, TN next September. The details for this new competition will be outlined in the 2009-2010 District Directory.

## What do you do for a living?

I am Director of Engineering Services for the University of Tennessee. In short, my department delivers sound and pictures to the university. We're like the A/V guys you used to call to roll the film-strip projector cart from the library to your classroom (for those of you that remember film). We maintain the Jumbotron in Neyland Stadium and Thompson Boling Arena, we install and support over 200 technology-enhanced classrooms, we provide web-streaming services

and we operate the university's video conferencing system. (Yes. It's a fun job)

## Who greets you at night when you come home?

I am married to Jayne Henderson Hillhouse, a clinical dietitian with the University of Tennessee Medical Center. Jayne is from Monticello, GA. We have been married for 15 years and have one son, Andy, who is 12. Besides Jayne and Andy, our two pugs, Sundae and Angel, meet me at the door every night.

## How did you get involved in Kiwanis?

As a former Key Clubber at Knoxville Central High School, I got involved with Kiwanis over 30 years ago. I was the Lt. Governor for Division 5B and served on the Key Club District Board my senior year in high school.

## What does your home club do for the community?

Northside, Knoxville supports three Key Clubs (Central, Halls, and Fulton) and is sponsor of K-T's second Aktion Club in the district. As District Chair for the Key Leader program, I have leaned heavily on Northside members for support of the program. Northside's principle fund-raiser is their Annual Pancake and Bake Sale. Since its inception, the fund-raiser has provided the club the opportunity to funnel more than \$348,000 back to the community in the form of service projects and donations. Organizations such as the Boy Scouts of

America, the Cerebral Palsy Center of Knoxville, Boys & Girls Clubs, Camp Eagle's Nest, the Ronald McDonald House, and countless others have benefited from the service that Northside provides.

## What is your favorite project?

I don't have one favorite project. I have a whole bunch! One of my fellow Northside Kiwanians, Mary Ann Fennell, said something during my year as president that reminded me of why we are Kiwanians. She said that everything the club does should result in service. Like most clubs, we gave out certificates to our speakers. They were nice and the speakers appreciated them but they didn't translate into service. We decided if everything we did should be service-oriented, we would stop giving certificates, buy books for the local elementary school libraries and ask our speakers to sign them. The books were then donated to the school libraries in honor of the speaker and our club. Now, even meetings result in service back to the community.

## What other organizations are you a part of?

I also serve on the board of directors for the Cerebral Palsy Housing Corporation. This non-profit organization oversees the operation of the only community supported group home in the state of Tennessee that provides housing for adults with disabilities. I am a Past Master and the treasurer of Fountain City Lodge #757, F&AM.

## Do you have a special Kiwanis Moment to share?
